The European Geosciences Union, EGU (www.egu.eu), is a non-profit international union of scientists with over 12,500 members from all over the world. It is Europe's premier geosciences union, which is dedicated to the pursuit of excellence in the geosciences and the planetary and space sciences for the benefit of humanity.

What we do

Open Science: We publish 17 peer-reviewed open access journals covering various topics within our scientific disciplines. Each year over 6,000 papers are published with more than 20,000 contributing authors.

Meetings: Our annual conference attracts over 11,000 scientists from over 100 countries worldwide. Additionally, we co-sponsor meetings promoting scientific discussion and innovation. We also organise workshops for scientists and interested stakeholders.

Communication, Outreach & Education: We regularly publish press releases and have a monthly newsletter on our latest research. We have a substantial range of educational activities and resources, and have an established blogging and social media presence.
